Franklin High School Turns 100!

The 2011-12 school year marks the 100th anniversary of Franklin High School, located at the foot of 31st Avenue South and Mount Baker Boulevard. The beautiful Beaux Arts architectural style of the Franklin High School building contributed to its reputation as one of the finest school buildings west of the Mississippi in its early days. By the 1980's the school had many structural problems which led the school district to propose to replace the school with a new building. A concerted effort by the Franklin community of student, staff and faculty as well as alumni, Mount Baker and Beacon Hill neighborhoods and the Landmark Preservation Board saved the school from the wrecking ball and led to a two year building renovation. Now local neighborhood students gather in the Commons with its magnificent windows reaching to the soaring ceiling, and enjoy the vintage brass clock Property of Museum of History & Industry, Sea

President's Corner Board Sets Its Focus for 2011-2012!

Dear Mount Baker Friends and Neighbors –

The MBCC Board of Directors held its annual planning retreat on Saturday, June 4th. In addition to welcoming back fourteen returning members, we welcomed Chris Ferree, who is taking over the Treasurer role from Jon Park, and Doug McBroom, who is succeeding Kassia Nye as the Martin Luther King Jr. Scholarship Fund representative to the Board. Please see the "masthead" of this newsletter for a full list of our Board members, and how to reach these hard-working and enthusiastic volunteers.

During a very full morning session, the Board discussed and debated a variety of strategic issues, and agreed to focus on four major areas during the coming year, as follows:

Mission: In concert with input from the community-at-large, we will clarify the overall purpose and mission of the Community Club organization, and clearly articulate how we intend to fill that purpose.

Outreach: We will broaden and deepen our reach within the community. We will broaden our connections by working to help more Mount Baker residents understand the existence and purpose of the Club, and, for those of you already familiar with the fact that we are owned by the residents of Mount Baker, we will work to improve and enrich your experiences with the Club.

Programs: We will work with our neighbors to identify more members of our community who we have not yet had the pleasure of meeting, and make particular efforts to engage them in identifying programs and activities of interest to them. We will also work to identify which of our current programs and activities are most popular, and work to bring the community more of those already successful programs.

Governance: The Board will continue its ongoing efforts to improve our governance methods and organizational structure. The areas we'll focus on include:

- Develop a succession plan that supports a stable and strong organization
- Improve our ability for financial reporting and forecasting
- "Lean into" our fund development efforts, and build on the success of the first year of our Annual Fund
- Continue our ongoing review of the Club's policies and by-laws.

Zoning, Land Use, Planning and Transportation (ZLUPT) Committee

Since May 5 when over 100 people gathered to discuss the City's proposed plan for the town center at Mt. Baker Station, the Community Club has hosted a number of well-attended meetings to focus on particular issues:

- June 6: Building height and density, including discussion of public benefits in exchange for increased height.
- June 28: Contaminated site at NE corner of 31st Ave S. and S. Day St. (After 14 years of delay and inattention there is finally movement by Chevron and WSDOT to clean up the site and return it to private ownership. David Berger has been leading this effort, and he can be contacted at davidberger@hilakers.org.)
- June 30: Design guidelines and the city's design review process. These can be used by community residents to influence new development as it occurs.
- July 14: One-way Rainier/MLK couplet, including review of consultant reports, consideration of traffic impacts on S. McClellan and 31st Av S., and identification of possible traffic-calming options.

NEXT STEPS

Legislation to implement any proposed changes is scheduled to be submitted to the City Council in September, at which point the council will establish a time frame for consideration of the proposed plan and schedule public hearings.

Governance Updates... Lively Annual Meeting

A hot topic at the MBCC annual meeting held May 2 was the issue of "advocacy". Specifically, what should the community club's role be with regard to "representing" the Mount Baker neighborhood on potentially contentious public policy issues? The immediate subject that had meeting attendees "riled up" was the city's proposed roadway and land use changes for the Mount Baker light rail station area. But, the discussion raised the broader issue of if and when the MBCC board should attempt to "speak" for the neighborhood.

A number of attendees argued that advocacy in furtherance of the neighborhood's interest is core to the community club's mission. Others pointed out how difficult it is, in practice, to decide for 4,500 households what is in their best interest. How does the board go about informing everyone about an issue, determining how everyone feels about it, and deciding what a consensus position looks like?

These questions weren't new to the board. In fact, on January 31, 2011 the board adopted a "Position of Support" policy addressing this very issue. The policy distinguishes among different situations, and outlines procedures and outcomes appropriate to each.

If issues are related to the MBCC mission, occur substantially within the boundaries of the Mount Baker community, provide a clear benefit to the community, have been presented and discussed at a scheduled MBCC community meeting, and have limited or no opposition, the board may produce a "letter of support".

If an issue has any of the following characteristics, the policy calls for a different process:

- is not closely related to the MBCC mission;
- is partially or completely outside the boundaries of the Mount Baker community;
- is likely to generate multiple and/or opposing points of view; or
- is political or semi-legislative in nature.

Under any of these conditions, the board will place the issue on the agenda of two community meetings. The topic will be introduced at the first meeting, advertised in the intervening month using the media then in use by the club, and discussed at the second meeting. At the second meeting, a poll of those community residents present will be taken and the results of the poll will be tabulated. A "statement of results" will be written up stating the final count of each opinion. This statement will be reviewed for accuracy by the appropriate committee, and affirmed by a vote of the board prior to being disseminated. The statement serves as a public record of how those attending the meeting felt about the issue; it does not attempt to put a forth a "Mount Baker position".

The adopted policy clearly shows that the board, being very aware of the diversity of opinions held by Mount Baker residents, is hesitant to claim to speak on behalf of the entire Mount Baker community. By all means, let a board member know if you think the policy can be improved.

Secretary's View of MBCC Business

April 4, 2011 community meeting:

- Colman Park supporters Elise Erickson and Prentis Hale have written a \$12,000 grant proposal to Seattle Parks for renovation of the existing Colman Park shed. The Colman P-Patch consists of 37 principal gardeners and 60 pounds of food was donated to food banks last year.
- Governance and Nominations committee chair, Rob Mohn, announced board candidates for our May 2 annual elections. Rob invited nominations from those present in the audience, but there were none.

May 2, 2011 community meeting:

- Ross Tilghman announced the Mount Baker Rowing and Sailing Center meeting room expansion in July. It's big enough to seat 90-100 people for dinner.
- Sue Cary announced our ZLUPT meeting schedule with Seattle's Department of Planning and Development concerning the Mount Baker light rail station overlay and the North Rainier neighborhood development plan. The community was briefed on our board policy to publish the results of any vote taken rather than stating board positions on such topics.
- Bronwyn Doyle announced her introductory yoga series at the clubhouse in May.
- Lloyd Hara, King County Assessor, gave a 20 minute presentation: Your Property Taxes, Local Levy Rates, and How They Affect You.
- Chris O'Claire presented the METRO Trolley Bus System Evaluation Findings.

- Rebecca Laszlo read the proposed changes to our mission statement, then recorded several comments and suggestions to the draft from the community.
- Katie Egolf reviewed our election policy then read the names of the withdrawing board members: Anna Leslie, Jon Park, Kassia Nye, and Katie Egolf. Their contributions were gratefully acknowledged.
- Katie then read the board candidates: Bethany Furubayashi, Bill Davis, Colin Macdonald, Chris Ferree, Dawn Counts, Doug McBroom, Gale Devol, Lee Stanton, Loie Docter, Martha Ries, Matt Nye, Mike Rooney, Peter Greaves, Rebecca Laszlo, Rob Mohn, Sue Cary, and Susan Moore. Note: Susan Moore has since withdrawn from the board. There were 33 votes to approve this slate of board candidates, 0 votes against, and one community member abstained.
- Katie read the names of officer candidates: Lee Stanton for President, Mike Rooney for Vice President, Chris Ferree for Treasurer, and Bill Davis for Secretary. The vote to accept the slate of officer candidates was unanimous.

There was no June, July or August community meeting, as per our summer hiatus.

The next community meeting will be 7:00 PM September 12, 2011, preceded by 30 minute social beginning at 6:30 PM. Note the new date – the Monday after Labor Day.


By All Measures, Fiscal Year 2010 Was a Very Good Year!

Annual Report "lite"



As we reflect on the 2010-11 fiscal year, we are struck by the significant growth of the Mount Baker Community Club. Much credit goes to the marketing, creative energy and tireless effort of director Tara Morgan, compounded of course by volunteer effort. MBCC brings our community an eclectic mix of exciting programs which have neighbors flocking to the clubhouse again. Signature events like the Neighborhood Potluck and Pied Piper bring big crowds, while experimental debuts like Harvest the Arts and Day of Service prove successful. Clubhouse rentals remain strong even in a down economy, with increased usage during the daytime hours by nonprofits and local businesses.

In turn, many people showed their support by generously giving to the first-ever Annual Fund. A robust Annual Fund helps support clubhouse programs and events, ensuring that they remain accessible to everyone in the neighborhood. We set what we felt was an ambitious goal in year one: \$15,000 (double the income from the previous year's dues-based model). We exceeded that mark, thanks to the members of our generous community who collectively gave nearly \$19,000. We are incredibly grateful for your support this year. Please know that the re-invigorated clubhouse is made possible by each of you.

SPD Selects Mount Baker Safe Neighborhood Committee as its First Living Room Forum

Officers from the Seattle Police Department's South precinct met with members of the Mount Baker Safe Neighborhood Committee (MBSNC) on June 30. The initiative, called "Living Room Forum" is designed to help officers build positive community relations.

Crime rates have been trending down both nationally and locally. Experts who analyze crime data cite several possible causes. Although we lay folks are comforted by seeing those blue and white SPD cars patrolling our neighborhoods, cruising is not the most effective crime deterrent. Foot patrols are more effective. In some inner-city communities, crime rates have been significantly reduced because officers walk through the neighborhoods. The experts who analyze the data also believe potential victims are better at protecting themselves and being proactive is a contributing factor. The officers complimented the collective work of Mount Baker for being an example of the latter and said we were specifically chosen to be the first community because of our work. They are hoping to offer similar meetings with other community groups as a way to build relationships.

Additional meeting highlights to share:

- Call 911 to report suspicious activity; make that call and patiently follow the 911 dispatcher's prompts. Relay as many details as possible.
- SPD officers work well with First Security Inc. officer and see her as extra set of 'professional' eyes

Rainier Court Park & Artwork Dedication

On June 15 SouthEast Effective Development (SEED) dedicated a new Park and Artwork at its Rainier Court development in the Mount Baker neighborhood. A Commerce Grant from the State of Washington enabled SEED to add significant amenities and infrastructure to benefit this community.

The park, located adjacent to the vacated Spokane Street right-of-way between 34th and 35th Avenues South, serves as a link between the Rainier Court community and the surrounding Courtland/Mount Baker neighborhood. Four basalt sculptures created by local artist Ken Barnes, entitled "Igneous Ensemble", were installed in the park. SEED hopes the entire community takes ownership of this unique neighborhood open space.

A stunning installation of 14-foot tall flowers in front of the Courtland at Rainier Court was also dedicated. These pieces, by local artist Alessandra Panieri, complement the sidewalk and light pole artwork entitled "Guardian Spirits" that was installed in 2009. As the subsequent phases of the Rainier Court project are developed, additional sets of the flowers, light poles and sculptures will be added, setting a theme for the new neighborhood.

Residents Can Help City Light Enhance Streetlight Safety

Last Thanksgiving a tragic accident occurred when a beloved pet died after touching a groundcover plate associated with a metal streetlight pole on Queen Anne hill.

Seattle City light responded to the incident by testing all 37,000 pieces of metal streetlight equipment and making repairs to any equipment that registered any amount of voltage. In all, City Light found 56 instances where there was voltage of more than 30 volts. Among the causes were frayed or pinched wires, broken photocells that turn on the lights during darkness, and deteriorated wires on older equipment.

The utility urges anyone who suspects a problem with a streetlight to report it at (206) 684-7056.

Citizen Tips: How can you recognize if there might be a problem with a streetlight? If you see lights that stay on during daylight hours, or a light that flickers on and off when it's dark, or an animal shying away from a pole, these could indicate a problem with the light.

Several people have helped City Light find recent problems In Mount Baker. Last April, a man reported his dog was shocked when it sniffed a small, metal plate at the base of a concrete streetlight pole on 32nd Avenue S. between S. Atlantic and S. Massachusetts Streets. The dog was not injured. The owner called City Light and within an hour crews were on the scene.

These incidents have raised public awareness about the potential danger that can exist whenever electricity is present. Working with you, City Light can minimize the risk, particularly in public access areas.

"If you encounter a streetlight that is not operating properly or suspect it might have a problem, please let us know [via the above phone number] and we'll take care of it immediately," Superintendent Jorge Carrasco said. "Safe, reliable service is our top priority."
